This group contains nine States and two Territories. The States are: Montana, Wyoming, and Colorado, crossed by the Rocky Mountains; Idaho, Utah, and Nevada, lying on the great table-land; Washington,

Oregon, and California, upon the Pacific coast. The Territories are Arizona and New Mexico, on the tableland.

On the **table-land**, excepting in Idaho, the country is so dry that not much of the surface is fit for agriculture, except where it can be irrigated.

The Rocky Mountain States are all rich in silver and gold, and Montana has very productive copper

mines. Colorado, in 1895, produced more gold than any other State in the Union; and the United States, more than any other country in the world.

The **Pacific States** have the broadest and most fertile valleys in the high western half of the United States. California was once the greatest gold State; but much has since been discovered in Colorado and elsewhere.
