LESSON LXII. OHIO.

1. Ohio is an agricultural state, and noted for its rapid growth in wealth and population.

2. It ranks first among the states in the quantity of wool and Indian corn produced; among the first in wheat, and only second in barley, cheese, and live-stock.

3. The face of the country is generally level. A ridge of highlands extends through the state, separating the rivers flowing north from those flowing south into the Ohio.

4. The Ohio River, which forms the entire southern boundary, is navigable for steamboats to Pittsburgh, in Pennsylvania, a distance of nearly 1,000 miles.

5. At some seasons, the water in the Ohio becomes so low that it can not be navigated. The average range between high and low water is generally about 50 feet.

6. Coal and iron abound. The coal region extends from the Scioto River through the southeastern part of the state to the Pennsylvania line.

7. Ohio surpasses all the other states of the Mississippi Valley in the number of its flourishing cities and villages.

8. Cincinnati, called the Queen of the West, is, with the exception of New Orleans, the largest town west of the Alleghany Mountains. Its commerce and manufactures are important. It is noted for being the largest pork market in the world.

9. Cincinnati is distinguished for its literary and benevolent institutions. The Cincinnati Observatory stands on the top of Mount Adams, an eminence near the city.
